
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INTRODUCTION

THIS CAREER GUIDE, THE FIRST IN A SERIES BY ABN, INTRODUCES FOREIGN-TRAINED PROFESSIONALS TO A COMPREHENSIVE VIEW OF THE HEALTHCARE FIELD AND OFFERS GUIDANCE TO OCCUPATION AND TRAINING PROGRAMS RESEARCH.

We are aware that navigating a career pathway in the U.S. with foreign training can be difficult, so we hope the information here will lead professionals to a jumping off point rather than starting anew.

To do this, the guide highlights key information regarding credentials such as certifications and licensures in **Chapter 1**. It is important to understand what they mean and when they are required before beginning the job search.

In **Chapter 2**, we discuss career ladders in nursing and healthcare and provide a framework for thinking about career advancement. We believe by thinking about occupation and training in partnership, professionals can plan a career pathway which allows them mobility.

Chapter 3 focuses on training and education research. We highlight short-term, non-degree certification programs as they can provide career entry points for foreign-trained professionals without too much time or resources.

We have included in **Appendix D** a list of occupations accompanying shortand long-term training programs in Eastern Massachusetts, including helpful information such as range of cost, length, and contact information.

Throughout the guide we provide links to external resources such as credential evaluation and job market databases. We hope that through utilizing the guide, foreign-trained professionals will find points of entry or a "bridge" career in the healthcare field that will allow them to build a career in addition to their previous experience.

WHY HEALTHCARE?

This guide, the first in a series to be completed by ABN, focuses on the healthcare field. This is why healthcare is a useful starting point:



CHAPTER 1

CAREER PATHWAYS AND CREDENTIALS: EXPLANATIONS AND DEFINITIONS

There are a variety of credentials that may be available to you as you choose your career pathway. A career pathway is defined as a series of steps you take to move forward in your career and advance over time to better professional opportunities.



Many occupations and careers in the U.S. require specific credentials, usually a license or a certificate, in order to practice legally. This is especially true in the healthcare field.

Career Pathway Programs

For the purposes of this guide, "short-term certification and career pathway programs" refers to courses of study offered by a recognized institution (e.g., a community college or trade school) leading to a certificate indicating an individual's qualification or competence to practice in a specialized, skilled occupation, based on successful completion of the program.

This includes programs ranging in length from a few weeks to two years; offering full or part-time options; and including online coursework as well as in-person classes.

Credentials:

Credentials can be either academic or work-related, including a certificate, diploma, degree, certification or license.

Academic credentials

Such as a certificate, diploma or degree, are issued by an educational institution and show your level of educational attainment

Occupational credentials

Such as a certification or license, are used by employers to establish that a job applicant has achieved a required level of skill mastery to practice in a job title or has established legal permission to work in that profession.¹

Occupational or professional licenses

Awarded by a government licensing agency (typically at the state level) permitting the holder to practice in a specific field. These are based on criteria that may include some combination of degree attainment, certifications, certificates, assessment, apprenticeship programs, or work experience. Licenses are also time-limited and must be renewed periodically.²

More information can be obtained from the relevant licensing boards.

Industry certifications

Awarded by a certification body (not a school or government agency) based on demonstrating, through an examination process, the possession of the knowledge, skills, and abilities to perform a specific occupation or skill. Such certifications are commonly time-limited and need to be periodically renewed. More information can be obtained from the relevant industry-certifying organizations.

Some credentials may be required to work in a certain job title, while others may be optional and listed on a job description as desirable. When qualifications or credentials are listed as desirable, it indicates that you are not required to have them to apply, but they will make you a stronger candidate for the position. For many skilled immigrants, they find that a U.S. credential is not necessarily a requirement to apply but having a U.S. credential can make them a more competitive candidate overall.

Credential Evaluation

A credential evaluation is a report that measures the academic equivalence of your diploma from your home country and verifies it as valid for a U.S. employer or academic institution. A credential evaluation is not always required, but, if you decide to pursue a professional license or enter a degree program, it is likely that you will need one. A credential evaluation can take time and cost money, so it is important to plan for the fees and time associated with this process.

Note: Your credential evaluation must be prepared by a recognized foreign credential evaluation service. Always check with an institution, licensing agency, or employer to verify their specific requirements for credential evaluation. Many times, the credential evaluation must be sent in a sealed, unopened envelope directly from your former institution to the evaluator. In some cases, you must use only one specified credential evaluation service, and in other cases, you can choose which service you prefer.




For example, if you want to apply for a nursing license in Massachusetts, you must use the CGFNS credential evaluation service.

If you need a credential evaluation for a different academic or employment purpose, you can find a list of verified agencies through the member list of NACES (National Association of Credential Evaluation Services).

Professional Licenses in Healthcare

Healthcare is a highly regulated professional field. That means a professional license is often required for many positions, especially those requiring a two-year degree or higher (including nurse, physician, and physical therapist).


For those seeking to relicense in their home country occupations, gaining a license typically requires an evaluation of their international academic credentials, completing exams, and additional coursework, as well as U.S. work experience.



There is no one single process for licensing in each state. Each state and profession has different requirements, depending on the rules of the licensing board or other agencies. A general overview of licensing requirements for healthcare professions in Massachusetts can be found at

mass.gov/topics/health-care-licenses.

As licensing can be a very complex, time-consuming, and expensive process, short-term credentials can provide a more practical option for entering the healthcare sector, whether as the start of a new career or as an interim occupation while pursuing a license.



CHAPTER 2

CONDUCTING HEALTHCARE OCCUPATION RESEARCH

Key Considerations

Often the first step for foreign trained professionals is to research job titles of interest to learn more about job duties and responsibilities in the U.S., and to identify which jobs are a good match for your skills and interests. By using labor market research through O*NET OnLine or working with a career advisor, you can identify which jobs are expected to be in demand as indicated by projected growth. You can also find potential wage information, which can help you identify if pursuing further training is a good investment.

In general, jobs with greater responsibilities and earnings require greater investment in training. Make sure you understand the time and effort involved in gaining a license or certification for an occupation to determine it is worth the investment.

Guiding Questions

When researching occupations that interest you, here are some questions to consider:



- 1. What education or experience is required?
- 2. What special skills are required?
- 3. Will I need a foreign education credential evaluation to apply for this job?
- 4. Do I need a professional license or industry qualification to apply for this job?
- 5. Will I need additional training or work experience to gain a license or industry qualification?
- 6. What is the projected job growth?
- 7. What is the entry-level or average wage?
- 8. Who are the local employers for this type of job?
- 9. How will this job help me advance in my career?
- 10. What is my next step if I am interested in this type of job?

Career Ladder

A career ladder indicates the typical entry-level job title in a professional field, followed by the types of positions with increasing levels of responsibilities to show how you can advance to greater earnings. Below is an example of a career ladder for patient care and nursing job titles.



Sample Career Ladder in Patient Care and Nursing





CHAPTER 3

CONDUCTING TRAINING PROGRAM RESEARCH

Career pathway training programs in healthcare occupations are offered in a variety of settings, including community colleges, trade schools, and nonprofit workforce training organizations. The nature and cost of programs, level of student support, and the value of the credential received provided may vary considerably depending on the setting.

The sections on the following pages provide guidance in helping you to research and choose a program that is right for you.

Key Considerations

Before entering a training program, you may want to evaluate some of the potential barriers to success in completing a career transition and make sure you have everything you need to move forward:





Immigration and Education Documentation

Many training programs require work authorization. Make sure you have your work authorization, official academic transcript and other required documents readily available.



English Language Proficiency

Some level of English language proficiency is necessary to complete training. It is recommended that you consider your proficiency level and check if your training program provides English Language support.



Cost of the Training Program

Costs vary widely depending not only on the duration of the program but the institution offering it. Training costs can include not just tuition but texts and other instructional materials. Some institutions provide scholarships or financial incentives or assistance obtaining educational loans. Be sure to consider your ability to afford any program before committing to it.



Licensing or Credentialing Costs and Timeline

Besides the training program cost, there may be an additional cost for registering for the licensing exams.



Hiring and Employment Opportunities

It is important to learn more about the employment opportunities after the completion of the training program. Find out if the training program provides support with job placement.

Guiding Questions

Exploring a Training Program:

► Will this course prepare me for a licensing or certification exam, or an industry-recognized examination?



- ▶ Is this course accredited? Does the course use a curriculum approved by an industry organization or official agency?
- ▶ Will I get university credit toward a degree for taking this course?
- ► Who is the instructor? What are the qualifications of the instructor for this course?
- ▶ Is there a sample syllabus for this course that I can view to decide if it is right for me?
- ▶ Does the program or school have an admissions counselor or student advising service that can help me learn about the program?

Eligibility:

- ▶ Is this course for state or local residents or only? For U.S. citizens and legal permanent residents only?
- ▶ Do applicants have to submit foreign transcripts, diplomas, or licenses?
- ▶ Do I have to apply to a college or university to enroll in this course?

- ► What are the prerequisites for taking this course? Is there a qualifying examination to enter this course?
- ▶ Do I have adequate English to succeed in this course?

Course Structure:

- ▶ How many hours is the course? What is the daily and weekly schedule?
- ▶ How many hours of homework is expected each week?
- ► Can I manage the time commitment of the course, especially if I am working or caring for family members?
- ▶ Is there an online component to the class? What are the requirements for completing the online component (technology needed, software used)?
- ► How are students graded during the course? Is the course a lecture-style class or does it have active student participation in pair/group work?

Student Support Services:

- ▶ Is there tutoring available if I need help?
- ▶ How do I get extra help from the instructor or teaching assistants if I need it?
- ▶ Does the school provide childcare or transportation assistance if I need it?


- ▶ Is there an opportunity for an internship with local employers as part of this course?
- ▶ Will the school help me get a job after the course? Which employers have hired graduates of this course?

Costs:

- ▶ How much does the course cost, and how is that cost calculated (by credit, by year)?
- ▶ Do I only need one course or do I have to take a series of courses for certification?
- ► Are there lab fees or additional campus fees? Are books included?
- ► Are scholarships or loan programs available for this course? Can the program help me find financial aid?
- ▶ What are the refund policies if I can't complete the course and need to drop out?

Educational Options:

- ▶ Is there an accredited online version of this course?
- ► Are there free courses that might help me prepare to succeed in this program?
- ► Are there special training programs in this subject for internationally-trained immigrants?





Resources for Finding Training Programs

HOW CAN YOU DECIDE IF A TRAINING PROGRAM IS RIGHT FOR YOU?

The programs listed in **Appendix D** show training providers in the Eastern Massachusetts. Not all training programs are alike, however, and you should make certain a program fits your needs before committing a significant amount of time and money to a course of study.

APPENDIX A

RESEARCHING A JOB TITLE: PHYSICAL THERAPIST ASSISTANT (PTA)



The role of the Physical Therapist Assistant (PTA) is to assist licensed physical therapists in providing physical therapy services to patients and requires formal training. Responsibilities vary and may include: assist patients in exercises to function in daily life, collect patient data and monitor progress, engage and encourage patients, and work with a physical therapist to enact and modify treatments (O*NET 2019; American Physical Therapy Association 2021).



"Most physical therapist assistants and aides work full time. Some may work nights and weekends because many physical therapy offices and clinics have extended hours to accommodate patients' schedules." (BLS 2018)





Common Workplace Settings

Physical Therapist Assistants work in a wide variety of settings, including: hospitals, private practices, outpatient clinics, home health, nursing homes, schools, sports facilities, and more (APTA 2019).



Degree and Licensure Requirements

Physical Therapist Assistant education should be done in a CAPTE-accredited two-year associate degree program. This assures that graduates are prepared for their careers and also for taking the national licensure examination. Licensure or certification is required and more information on Massachusetts licenses can be found at the MA Office of Consumer Affairs and Business Regulation. Local Massachusetts training programs cost \$18,000 to \$28,000 per year for two years, but many programs offer financial assistance.



Salary

The median national salary for a PTA in 2018 was \$48,090 per year or \$23.12 per hour, but averages \$58,000-\$69,000 in Massachusetts (BLS 2018).



Growth Projection

According to the **Commission on Accreditation in Physical** Therapy Education (CAPTE), there are currently 284 institutions offering Physical Therapy and Physical Therapy Assistant programs, including 7 in Massachusetts (CAPTE 2019). The job outlook for the next ten years is 26%, which the Bureau of Labor Statistics cites as "much faster than average" due to the needs of a population increasing in age and chronic health conditions such as obesity and diabetes (BLS 2018).

APPENDIX B

EDUCATION AND TRAINING PROGRAMS: GLOSSARY FOR UNDERSTANDING CHOICES IN EDUCATION

- ► Finding an accredited program
- Choosing a credit or non-credit program
- ► Identifying prerequisites
- ► Researching the curriculum, syllabus, and instructor
- Choosing in-person, blended (hybrid) or distance (online) learning options
- ► Income Share Agreement
- Pursuing internship opportunities





If a program is "accredited," it means that the school or organization has gone through a voluntary process to meet a standard of quality.



In general, it is important to look for an accredited program to guarantee that you are entering a program of study recognized as meeting the standards of a professional field.

For example, if you look into Bay State College's Associate Degree in Nursing Program, you will see evidence of accreditation: "Bay State College's Associate Degree in Nursing program has full approval status from the Massachusetts Board of Registration in Nursing. The Associate Degree in Nursing program is accredited by the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN)."


Some classes or training courses may be offered as "non-credit" or "for credit." A credit hour is the way an educational institution measures the number of academic hours of study needed to advance toward a degree.



If a class is "for credit," it means it will be recognized as counting toward the completion of a diploma or degree.

A "non-credit" class may be useful on its own, but it usually will not count toward fulfilling the requirements for an official diploma such as an associate, bachelor's, or master's degree.

"Prerequisites" are courses or skills that are required before (pre-) or prior to entering a class. Some courses will have no prerequisites, but other courses may require you to have already completed a particular class (Algebra I before Algebra II, for example), or, to demonstrate that level of knowledge or skill through examination.



When you are considering a training program, be sure to look for "Admissions Criteria" and ask: "What are the prerequisites for taking this class?"

A "curriculum" is an overview of a program of study, and usually for each course the instructor will prepare a "syllabus" or class outline of topics covered in the class. The syllabus lists the textbooks or additional materials required, as well as the amount of homework and expectations for class participation or group projects.



When you are researching a class, you can ask to see a sample syllabus from a past class, and you can check online to find further information regarding the instructor.

If you need help, an advisor in the admissions office should be able to tell you more and to help you with the application process.

A "hybrid class" is a course that is delivered with a combination of in-person and internet instruction.

In-person instruction was significantly reduced in 2020 when online learning and distance learning became more common.



You want to be sure you are prepared to meet the challenges of an online classroom as it relates to internet and technology demands, such as required software or equipment.

Be sure to check the technology requirements of any class offered in an online or hybrid format. An "Income Share Agreement" is a loan alternative that can help to fund your training program. Recipients agree to pay a percent of their income for a predetermined period of time.

- As you are considering a training program, you may also want to look for evidence of student support services, such as tutoring.
- ▶ You want to make sure you know what to do if you struggle to meet the demands of a class or are at risk of failing.
- ▶ Similarly, check and make sure you understand requirements related to examinations (online or in-person, oral or written, how often they are given) as well as grading.
- ▶ Lastly, note the process for obtaining a transcript of your course of study or final certificate as proof of completing the course should you need it in the future.

An internship is a program that provides work experience to people starting out in a profession.

Check to see if a program of study has a required internship. Internships can be paid or unpaid, and some skilled immigrants have found that completing required unpaid internship hours can be a stumbling block in certification if they also need to support a family and to have earned income on a regular basis.




Internships can be helpful, however, in connecting you to potential employers and giving you related job experience. Many educational programs will list the employers with whom they collaborate or where their graduates have gone on to work.


SAMPLE LICENSING COSTS FOR NURSING



In general, getting a professional license can be a challenging pathway because of the fees associated and the time needed to successfully complete each step.

If you are a foreign-educated nurse interested in licensure in Massachusetts, your first step should be to contact the **Boston Welcome Back Center at Bunker Hill Community College** for more information. The Welcome Back Center provides specialized assistance for nurses trained in other countries who want to work in Massachusetts.

Here are the general steps for licensing in nursing:



Each step in the licensing process has a cost.

Costs may vary for each applicant, depending on an individual's background, needs, and proficiency.
